Harvard bestows prestigious honor upon LSUHSC's Gee

Dr. Rebekah Gee, Assistant Professor of Health Policy and Management and Obstetrics and Gynecology in our Schools of Public Health and Medicine, was invited to Harvard to give the annual Betty Pitcher lecture on the

occasion of the 180th anniversary of the Boston Lying-in Hospital and the 100th anniversary of the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital at Brigham and Women's Hospital. She was one of three Harvard alumni invited to speak and the third person awarded this lectureship. Her lecture – “The End of Birth Control Politics?” – was very well received.

Dr. Gee, who is also the Medicaid Medical Director for the State of Louisiana, trained in Obstetrics and Gynecology at Harvard at the Brigham and Women's and Massachusetts General Hospitals.

She has held many leadership roles in organized medicine and women's health at state and national levels. This year Dr. Gee is serving as the expert for the first ever policy column for the journal *Obstetrics and Gynecology* – the nation's leading journal in the field.

LSUHSC's Trapido 1 of 2 invited academic presenters

Dr. Edward Trapido, Associate Dean for Research and Professor of Epidemiology at LSUHSC's School of Public Health, gave an invited talk on “Public Health Issues Following the Gulf of Mexico Oil Spill,” at the 2013 National Cancer Institute Directors Meeting in Lyon, France, this week. The meeting, held by the International Prevention Research Institute, included NCI Directors and researchers from Asia, Africa, South America, the Middle East, and Europe. Only two universities were invited to present.

Dr. Trapido, who is funded by the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences to study women and their children in the seven southeast parishes of Louisiana most affected by the spill, talked about the early physical, social, and mental health outcomes

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Foundation building, and the Human Development Center. Stops on the tour also included the library, the new lecture room in the Schools of Nursing and Allied Health Professions building, the School of Public Health, the Russell Klein, MD Center for Advanced Practice, and the Isidore Cohn, Jr., MD Student Learning Center.



We are grateful for the amount of time President Alexander was able to give us in his travels to LSU campuses around the state. We hope to welcome him back soon and often.

reported by the women, and explained the need for long term follow up to assess the potential cancer outcomes. He reported results on associations between exposure levels and experiencing worse health after the spill, and on public health issues related to resilience and recovery, health communications, economic issues, environmental justice, and policy issues. Dr. Trapido's study is one of a number of important studies funded by the NIEHS on the impact of the skills on clean up workers, other populations, and seafood around the Gulf. A brief interview about Dr. Trapido's talk will be appearing on eCancer.org, in a few weeks.


